Paint the Waterways

Water is an essential part of Ngarrindjeri culture and life. The waterways are the lifeblood of their land: the Murray Mouth, the Coorong and the Lower Lakes. The health and wellbeing of the people is deeply connected to that of the waterways.

- watercolour paints
- art paper
- paintbrushes
- optional: other paints or materials to experiment with

- 2. Paint a picture inspired by these waterways.
